About The American School Foundation

Located in Mexico City, ASF is the oldest continuously operating accredited American School outside of the United States. A PPK-12 IB World School, ASF offers a high quality bilingual education that meets requirements for entrance into world class American, International, and Mexican universities. With enrollment just over 2500, it houses Early Childhood, Lower School, Middle School and Upper School divisions.

From its beginnings as a kindergarten with a student body of nine and a faculty of one, The American School Foundation has evolved into today's thriving educational institution of some 2,500 students and 220 full-time teachers. For over 130 years, many thousands of young lives have been enriched by an ASF education. The school is proud of its vibrant history and traditions as one of the cornerstones of American and Mexican values in the country. Many of its alumni are leaders in all fields: civic, diplomatic, entrepreneurial, scientific, artistic, and intellectual. From its beginnings, ASF has had strong ties to the American ex-pat community, attracting and retaining long term board members and families. Its strong financial structures have withstood wars, revolutions, pandemics, and the school has been able to provide continuous education to its students throughout major crises. Today it stands as one of the pre-eminent schools in Mexico City offering an American and an International curriculum.

Located in the Tacubaya neighborhood of Mexico City, ASF facilities are built to fit the needs of every age group. Arts and athletic facilities are state of the art and provide students with opportunities to practice a variety of sports and explore artistic talents. ASF is divided into four sections, Early Childhood (PPK-K), Lower School (1-5), Middle School (6-8), and Upper School (9-12), each with its own facilities.

Programs

Early Childhood Center (K1, K2, K3)

The Early Childhood Center is an English-immersion program which follows the IB Primary Years Programme. Meaningful, integrated and in-depth lessons and engagement in math and literacy lay a strong foundation for future learning. Children participate in music, art, physical education and hands-on science classes. A kitchen program rounds out the curriculum.

Lower School (1 - 5)

The Lower School curriculum framework is the Primary Years Programme (PYP), which begins in K3. The PYP offers an inquiry-based approach to teaching and learning. The aim of the program is to develop







students into contributing world citizens according to the IB Learner Profile, instilling in students the desire to be inquirers, knowledgeable, thinkers, communicators, principled, open-minded, caring, risk-takers, balanced and reflective. The mission of the program is to teach students to relate the experience of the classroom to the realities of outside world, making them lifelong learners and informed citizens in an international environment. Students in grades 1-5 have two periods of instruction in Spanish that include Spanish Language Arts and the Mexican Social Studies program and support transdisciplinary learning. ASF offers several programs to support students' development of both the English and Spanish languages in the Language Learning Center located on the third floor of the Lower School Building. The Language Learning Center (LLC), includes systematic and explicit instruction for English as a Second Language (ESL) and Spanish as a Second Language (SSL). Students are assessed using criteria from such assessments as the IPT for Oral Language in English and Spanish, DIBELS (Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills), NWEA results and Diagnostic Reading Assessments. Based on the multiple forms of assessment a decision will be made by the LLC teachers, Academic Dean and Leadership team regarding entrance into the LLC. Another program designed to teach basic English structures for international students is Basic Academic Skills in English (BASE), offered to qualifying Lower School students at an additional cost. Children in this program have English instruction throughout the day, both in the regular classroom setting and oneon-one instruction or in small groups with the BASE teacher in the Language Learning Center (LLC).

Middle School (6 - 8)

Middle School ensures that students receive an individualized and well-rounded education through academic and social-emotional development. A standards-based curriculum is designed to support the variety of ways in which individuals learn. Our curriculum framework allows for conceptual and inquiry-based teaching and learning where teachers use current strategies and assessment practices to enhance the learning experience. We defer to project-based learning that enhances the cooperative nature of teaching and learning, differentiated instruction and grading and interdisciplinary units and inquiry that explore global contexts to understand human commonalities and ways to become contributing and purposeful citizens of the world. Additionally, we emphasize that all areas of teaching and learning must have a purpose, therefore, students must be able to express their learning in different ways and create ways to impact their community. Finally, our curriculum represents the continuity of building internationally-minded students who explore human commonalities and not only differences. All classes are taught in English except Mexican Humanities and Spanish Literature/Language. Outdoor learning experiences provide ASF students with the chance to develop character, learn valuable life skills, make new friends, learn curriculum in a different way and discover new interests. In Middle School, ASF

students have the opportunity to leave their textbooks behind to learn through outdoor activities that are highly educational and fun. These trips expose students to the amazing cultural variety of the sites we visit, while creating a live classroom in which to learn and explore. Whether it be canopy tours in the dense forests, a newfound understanding of the people and culture of an area or a trip to Washington D.C. for Capital Cities Week in grade 8, these opportunities invite students to learn firsthand.

Upper School (9 - 12)

Upper School students follow program requirements for the United States high school diploma, with optional coursework available through other programs listed below. In order to graduate students must complete course units in English, a language other than English, humanities, lab science, math, arts and design, coding, health, physical education and electives. Students also have the opportunity to enroll in any of the following programs available to enhance their education experience:

- The International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme: The IBDP is a two-year program that offers students advanced level work across six subject areas. Students may choose to enroll in the Full Diploma Programme or in individual IBDP courses. In some cases the IBDP coursework or diploma can be used to earn university credit. Additional fees are required for the Full IBDP and for individual courses.
 - Advanced Placement: Students may choose to enroll in individual AP courses or pursue the AP International Diploma or the AP Capstone Diploma by completing the required courses and exams for each program. AP courses offer advanced, college-level coursework, and in some cases, the possibility to earn university credit by achieving a certain score on the AP exam. Additional fees are required.
 - Mexican Program: This program offers students in the Mexican program validation of coursework for entry into public and private Mexican universities. Students who successfully complete the required courses will receive a SEP certificate. Students who wish to receive the UNAM certificate will need to pay a registration fee in Grades 10-12.

Services for Academic Success

The ASF special education program, Services for Academic Success (SAS), provides special education services to students with Specific Learning Disorders, Attention-Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) and Communication Disorders (Speech and/or Language Disorders). We are not equipped to provide services for other types of special education needs. The main purpose of this program is to provide intervention and academic support to students with diverse learning styles and needs to enable them to access the regular education curriculum at ASF.



Athletics

Sports offered are American Football, Basketball, Swimming, Running, Soccer, Tennis, Volleyball, Gymnastics and Alternative Sports.

All Middle School and Upper School teams (with the exception of american football) are under the umbrella of the Association of American Schools in Mexico (ASOMEX) and aim to attend the annual long-weekend tournaments held throughout Mexico. Varsity and Junior Varsity teams compete in the following leagues with revisions made on an annual basis:

Extended Learning

The Extended Learning program provides over 60 afternoon activities of academic enrichment, remedial and recreational activities for ASF community members of all ages, ECC to adults. Externals from other schools are welcome to join until Grade 5. Most classes are year round.

Part of that mission is creating opportunities for student agency – allowing students to develop their own voices and drive change. This opportunity avails in the Lower, Middle and Upper schools here at ASF, through the student council boards. As the academic year unfolds, several student leaders are eager to jump right in and put that agency to work.

Living in Mexico

Mexico City is a world class capital. At 2,200 meters (7,200 feet) above sea level, it boasts spectacular views of the mountains. The city is spread out beyond its original founding on top of Lake Tenochtitlan and boasts extensive public parks and beautiful tree-lined avenues. While Mexico City is a megacity, and one of eight in the world, it also offers the charm of small neighborhoods that are filled with activities for all tastes. Combining pre-Hispanic cultures and treasures with colonial and post-colonial art and architecture, modern Mexico boasts some of Latin America's greatest monuments and modern artists. It has been a haven for expats since the 19th Century and continues to be an economic and financial hub that attracts families from all over the world. Current international faculty at ASF describe it as a great city to discover and live in, and the country itself offers mountain and coastal resorts, beautiful, world renown beaches, and rich historical ruins and treasures. Mexicans are proud of their culture and country, and they are warm and welcoming. People who come to Mexico City intending to stay for two or three years often end up staying for a lifetime.
