HISTORY / OVERVIEW

Nearly 40 years ago, Dan Corley sat in his living room with a group of parents and community leaders to create a middle school. He chose the name "Community" to emphasize parent, volunteer, and neighborhood participation – as well as the diversity of the student body. Parents selected "Preparatory" to stress academic commitment. In the fall of 1984, Community Preparatory School opened with 25 students and three teachers in rented classrooms at the John Hope Settlement House.

Community Prep's growth and progress – a constant upward trajectory – reflect its evolving maturity. Today, the school proudly recognizes 930 graduates and a faculty of 13 dedicated educators. Its cherished 'Beloved Community' has been thoughtfully nurtured and continues to provide students with academic rigor and exceptional opportunities.



Mission

At Community Preparatory School, we empower our diverse student body to reach full academic and leadership potential while building a Beloved Community.

Community Preparatory School serves culturally and economically diverse students who are well qualified to benefit from a rigorous academic education in an atmosphere of mutual respect. By engaging with all facets of our students—intellectual curiosity, joyful learning, awareness of their own strengths, the rewards and satisfaction of determination, and a deep connection to our community and the larger world—we prepare our students to thrive in the most competitive high schools and to become community leaders.




Community Prep challenges students to become confident, independent learners and develop a strong sense of public service through community service and stewardship. We engage parents, students, and teachers in goal-setting and planning that ensures academic and social success for each student.

Inclusion

At Community Preparatory School, "inclusion" is an umbrella term that includes race, gender, ethnicity, culture, nationality, sexual orientation, gender identity, social/economic class, physical and learning differences, and religion, as well as other characteristics that contribute to each individual's full identity.

In pursuit of this goal, we are committed to moving from mere tolerance to active work against discrimination within our community and in the world. We will help students to become leaders in the fight against intolerance and teach them to work toward a just and equitable society. We understand that achieving our goal requires dedication and perseverance. We ask everyone in our community to commit themselves to this goal.

Education at Community Prep is a partnership between the school and the family. In partnership with families, Community Prep helps students work toward success in every aspect of life. While the school's curriculum focuses primarily on preparing students to meet the high demands of college-preparatory high schools, they also encourage social and emotional learning using the Responsive Classroom[™] approach.

Parental interest, involvement, and support of students (as exemplified in the school's core values of RESPECT), are essential. The school's core values of RESPECT (Responsible Role Model, Enthusiasm, Support, Preparedness, Effort, Challenge and Communication, and Trustworthiness & Truthfulness) are outlined in the student-parent-teacher contracts. In these contracts, the promise is made to make the most of the Community Prep educational opportunity and to honor its core values.

Curriculum

The school is divided into four learning families (4th-5th grade, 6th, 7th, and 8th). Each learning family has a faculty team responsible for teaching the four core disciplines: language arts, math, science and social studies. Students use Chromebooks, which are fully integrated in the curriculum, in their classrooms. In addition, all students take Spanish, health, creative arts, social emotional learning, technology and physical education classes. The overarching goal of the creative arts program (music/dance, visual art) is to help students develop the ability to use skills, media, tools and processes to express themselves in one or more of the creative arts.

At the outset of every marking period, students, parents, and teachers meet to set personal goals for the students. Students regularly review progress toward these goals. All members of the student-parent-teacher team must contribute toward achieving these goals, and the goals are assessed and modified at subsequent meetings.

The math curriculum at Community Prep is rigorous. Students apply the big ideas from each unit of study to solve challenging, real-world problems. Students take pre-algebra in grade seven and Algebra in grade eight.

Community Prep's language department recently adopted Empowering Writers. Writing across the content areas was identified as an area needing Professional Development. Thus, the teaching staff began updating grade-level curricula and standard instructional practices. After organizing the curriculum, teachers collaborated to build consensus and vertical alignment. Part of this alignment included the integration of the Empowering Writers Program. This evidence-based program focuses on teaching teachers strategies to improve students' writing skills and reading comprehension (Empowering Writers, 2021).

In August 2022, a representative from the program gave teaching staff an introductory lesson demonstrating ways to integrate the program across the curriculum. Teachers will continue working on this alignment throughout the year. The faculty is committed to working with the Empowering Writers Program and will participate in a full-day training focused on launching into literacy. In addition, the LA department is working on creating a school-wide writing rubric, and the science department is actively exploring ways to enhance vertical alignment in their curriculum.

In the summer of 2022, CP staff was trained by the International Institute for Restorative Practices (IIRP). Restorative practices prioritize developing community and conflict resolution through relationship building (IIRP, 2016). Teachers use both formal and informal restorative practices. Restorative practices can be proactive or reactive and include affective statements, affective questions, small conferences, circles, and formal conferences (IIRP, 2016). Faculty integrate these practices during the school day, especially during advisory, morning meetings, and social-emotional learning.

Community service has a special place in the School's curriculum. Many of the community service projects are conducted in the immediate neighborhood - some are local schoolbased projects while others reach into the surrounding community. Projects have included: collecting blankets for the homeless community; a canned food drive to support the Providence Animal Rescue League; a school store that raised money for the Tomorrow Fund and an organization protecting ocean life; and a dress-down day to support the people of Ukraine. The Gender Sexuality Alliance (GSA) planned and hosted a school dance with proceeds benefiting Youth Pride, an organization dedicated to supporting LGBTQIA+ Youth in RI.



FUTURE LEADERSHIP PROFILE

Interview Base

The Board of Trustees of Community Preparatory School is conducting a national search to identify a new Head of School. To that end, Deirdre Ling of Educators Collaborative facilitated a retreat for the Board of Trustees dedicated to outlining the search process. While on campus she met with administrative staff and had phone conversations with others. Subsequently, input was sought from the entire community via an electronic survey. Based on this work the following represents a summary of Community Prep's strengths, the challenges it faces in the next three to five years, and qualities and traits sought after in the next Head of School.

Strengths of Community Preparatory School

- Community Preparatory School enjoys an outstanding reputation in the Providence community for its academic rigor and its commitment to serving an economically diverse population of students.
- The school offers a student-centered education. Class sizes are small, and students are intellectually challenged. A culture of high expectations encourages them to find their passions.

- The school has retained a dedicated and loyal faculty, many of whom are long-tenured and masters of their respective disciplines.
- A strong curriculum prepares students well for high school and beyond.
- The spirit of community is palpable and is based upon mutual respect and kindness.
- Community Prep is fiscally strong. Highly successful fundraising and prudent stewardship have yielded a sizable endowment.
- CP graduates go on to high school and further education. A few alumni have returned to the school to teach.
- There is ample space for expansion and the school enjoys a harmonious relationship with its neighbors.
- The Board champions the school's mission and is actively and appropriately engaged.

Challenges for the School and the New Head

- Define and market the value of a CP education in the face of increased competition from other independent and charter schools in the area that have increased their efforts to enroll diverse students
- Consider the costs and benefits of expanding to a K-8 model
- Retain and replenish a dedicated and long-tenured faculty





- Promote excellent communication within the school community and community at large
- Attract new sources of revenue and support for strategic priorities—among them additional facilities space and refurbishment
- Consider appropriate size and composition of the Board
- Maintain and enhance outstanding academic and extracurricular programs
- Stay abreast of the evolving educational landscape, bringing best practices to Community Prep that are consistent with the school's foundational underpinnings

Characteristics of the Next Head of School



The next leader of Community Preparatory School should:

- Be passionate about the mission and culture of the school, respecting its unique strengths and building upon them
- Understand the demographics of the students the school serves and be committed to the principles of equity, inclusion, social justice and belonging
- Engage actively in the day-to-day life of the school and be visible and accessible to students, faculty and staff
- Be forward thinking about what will best prepare students for high school and beyond
- Be a tone setter, culturally fluent, empathic and emotionally generous
- Have a distributive management style that fosters collaboration

- Mentor teachers and administrators and support them in their professional development
- Model excellent oral and written communication skills
- Demonstrate sound fiscal acumen in the business and operational side of the school
- Serve as the spokesperson for the school, building upon the community engagement initiatives under way--developing new relationships and strengthening existing ones
- Embrace the challenges and opportunities of fundraising in partnership with the board and cultivate a new generation of donors



Conclusion

The ideal Head of School will be a leader who enjoys the day-to-day life of the school, is hands-on and committed to be a presence in the lives of students. S/he will celebrate academic excellence while continuing to strengthen the school's social justice culture and mission. With the completion of a beautiful new athletic facility and property acquisition adjacent to the school allowing for the possibility of programmatic expansion, the new Head will partner with the board to imagine Community Prep's future as it continues to admirably serve the Providence community.
