At our Lyman Campus in Shaker Heights, Kindergarten, First and Second Graders begin their journey through Primary School. Third, Fourth and Fifth Graders complete the Primary years just seven miles away at our 150-acre Butler Campus in Russell Township. Girls return to the Lyman Campus for Middle and Upper School to embark on Sixth through Twelfth Grades.

While we benefit from being a two-campus school that provides flexible indoor and outdoor learning spaces, we are one school when it comes to our philosophical approach to our students.



The Lyman Campus

The Lyman Campus is situated on 11 acres in suburban Shaker Heights, Ohio, and is home to classrooms, two gymnasiums, renovated visual arts studios, a Chapel Theatre and a dance studio for the Early Childhood, Primary, Middle and Upper Schools.



The Butler Campus

Opened in 2002, the 150-acre Butler Campus in Russell Township, Ohio, features outdoor education, experiential learning, unparalleled athletic fields, a 15-element Project Adventure Course, and a 16,000-square-foot fitness and wellness center.

Our Curricular Philosophy

To meet the needs of Laurel students, three kinds of learning in particular distinguish our curriculum: experiential, interdisciplinary and community-based. Experiential learning asks girls to be active rather than passive — students learn by doing. Interdisciplinary learning takes many forms and occurs throughout the Laurel curriculum. Connections to other disciplines help girls understand that the subjects they study do not exist in a vacuum, nor are they naturally discrete entities. Community-based learning allows students to use both interdisciplinary and experiential methods to further their understanding of the role they play in the world.

Sustainability

To better the world, the Laurel School community is committed to promoting sustainable environmental practices through education and action. We believe being responsible in our use of the earth's resources is the right thing to do. It is right for our students, our community, our global reach and our well-being.

Curriculum

- As a school, we place importance on instructional programming about environmental sustainability. We possess a practical real-world curriculum that helps students of all ages explore and understand sustainable practices.
- In our <u>Early Childhood School</u>, girls and boys participate in Eco!Wonder. This program allows children to explore and respect the natural world. Preschool and Prekindergarten end their year with an Eco!Wonder Celebration at the Butler Campus.
- <u>Kindergarten-Grade 2</u> girls spend Learning at Butler (LAB) days exploring nature and learning about the value of our environment. In Second Grade, students end the year focusing on water conservation during their Great Lakes study.
- <u>Third, Fourth, and Fifth Graders</u>, who are housed at our Butler Campus, are daily engaged in work that supports sustainability as they take advantage of the place-based curriculum to explore connections between themselves and the natural world, understand their power as responsible stewards of outdoor spaces, and design possible solutions to the challenges posed by human dependence on limited natural resources.
- Sixth Graders in the <u>Middle School</u> explore themes of climate change and worldwide sustainability in their English and Social Studies classes through both fictional and nonfictional texts and are called on to consider sustainable building materials







as part of their immersive Space Week experience, where they focus on designing a colony on Mars. Eighth Graders study Environmental Science during the full second semester and extend their lab skills into the field through water testing at the Butler and Lyman Campuses.

- The <u>Upper School</u> offers AP Environmental Science as well as a variety of STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, mathematics) opportunities for girls, including scientific research work and science fair participation. Extracurricularly, girls can participate in LEAF, a club that works to educate the Laurel community on issues surrounding climate change, environmental justice and sustainable living.
- Our <u>Environmental Justice</u> program, which focuses on the intersection between environmental issues and social justice, teaches Upper School girls at Laurel and neighboring schools to seek sustainable solutions to real-world issues.

STEM & STEAM

Our STEAM programming provides a myriad of experiences designed to allow students to make crossdisciplinary connections, and to develop the skills necessary for them to be: engaged citizens, competent evaluators of information, capable problem solvers, innovative thinkers and creators.

Why Arts? Arts is a crucial component of STEAM education because it brings creativity, imagination, and a holistic perspective to the traditionally analytical and technical aspects of STEM fields.

Why STEAM at Laurel? Interdisciplinary learning is a hallmark of Laurel School's academic programming from Early Childhood through Grade 12. As a national leader in STEM, Laurel School thinks strategically about how the skillset of an artist overlaps with and enhances skills mastered by professionals in traditional STEM fields. Where practical, our students are offered the opportunity to observe, to think critically, to interpret, to appreciate precision and scale and to communicate from the perspectives of a scientist, visual artist, mathematician, computer scientist, performance artist and engineer.

Entrepreneurship

Our students solve real-world problems through competing in business plan competitions, starting companies and working with local businesses. Whether running our student coffee business, pitching the next big idea in the Veale Youth Entrepreneurship Forum thinkBIG! Summit, or interning with an entrepreneur, there are endless ways for each girl to find her voice.

Laurel's Curricular Braid

Entrepreneurship, along with civic engagement, global studies and STEAM, is one of the themes woven through Laurel's Curricular Braid that sets the foundation for the Kindergarten-Grade 12 academic program. In Primary and Middle School, each year highlights two different strands of the curricular braid preparing girls for life in Laurel's Upper School where the braid continues to weave throughout the academic program to graduation. Entrepreneurship is featured in age-appropriate ways in Third Grade, Fifth Grade and Eighth Grade. In Upper School, girls are given the opportunity to create their own entrepreneurship path through Laurel's signature initiatives: the Protégé Internship Program and the Capstone Scholars Program.
