Our campus is home to year-round programming in which children thrive through experiential learning, interactions with the natural world, and collaborative discovery.

MONTESSORI'S DEVELOPMENTAL APPROACH

The whole curriculum is organized to serve students' developmental needs through carefully devised mixed-age classrooms. Students proceed through a detailed curriculum as a natural, enjoyable experience that satisfies his or her inner drive to learn and grow.

The 4 Planes of Human Development

Dr. Maria Montessori, trained as a physician, used her scientific background to develop an innovative approach to understanding child development. This approach divides the child's life into four six-year stages which together span birth to age twenty-four.

Mountaintop serves children through the first three of these stages. The faculty members observe each child throughout his or her development in order to understand what support is needed and to ensure appropriate guidance and challenge.

Stages at Mountaintop Montessori:

- 1st Plane: Toddler and Children's House (ages 18 months to 6 years of age Toddler through K)
- 2nd Plane: Elementary (ages 6 to 12 grades 1 through 6)
- **3rd Plane**: Middle School (ages 12 to 15 grades 7 through 8)



Toddler

The three toddler environments encourage self-discovery with activities that promote toddlers' budding independence by helping students learn to separate from their parents and caregivers. The need for autonomy at this age is strong; the Montessori classroom provides a safe environment where children can practice their burgeoning skills. Children are naturally drawn to activities that will meet their developmental needs.


- Open to students from 16 to 36 months
- Four-morning (Monday-Thursday) or five-day/ week programs
- Year-round enrollment is available
- Pick up is available at 11:45 am (one classroom) or 3:30 pm (two classrooms)
- After school care is available until 5:30pm

Children's House

During this stage of development, children are learning about their world through their senses and exploration. The classrooms support the development of independence, confidence, and self-control and provide the foundation for academic success. While learning to function independently in the classroom environment, students also learn to coexist in a peaceful community.

At this age, children love to repeat activities that are interesting to them. They are driven to refine the skills they need to meet their needs independently. Students begin their Children's House years with a strong desire to create order that leads them to invest their time in practical life and sensorial activities. This work is satisfying in its own right but is also laying important foundations for language and math. While working with beautiful materials, students develop remarkable concentration, fine motor skills, and a rich vocabulary.

Elementary

From six to 12 years, children are highly attuned to a wider world than what they knew in early childhood. With increasing interest in the social environment, children work in small groups to explore large concepts in pursuit of reasons, connections and patterns. In this learning environment, each child progresses at their own rate and is challenged with the opportunity to practice time management in the classroom.

The Montessori elementary curriculum is rich and interdisciplinary, connecting many subject areas into a vast network of interrelated information. With compelling stories, engaging materials, and individualized pacing and instruction, faculty members appeal to the students' imaginations and spark curiosity.

- Individualized curriculum plan and project-based learning
- Focus on mastery and ownership of learning
- Multi-age classrooms facilitate learning and leadership skills

Middle School

The Montessori program for middle school continues to support the development of the whole child during the phase of rapid growth and intense change that occurs between ages 12 and 15. Students appreciate intellectual challenge and meaningful work through which they can consider their place in society. With opportunities for both independence and community, they grow as adaptable members of a team and begin to create a vision for their personal future.

At Mountaintop, middle school students gain selfconfidence and self-knowledge that are not often found among this age group in other settings.

- Authentic Montessori mixed-age middle school program
- Opportunities for independent work and self-expression
- Overnight field trips and opportunities for community service
- Participation in leadership programs on campus and internships in the larger community
- Outstanding performance on standardized tests
- Successful placement in a variety of local high schools, both public and private



CO-CURRICULAR PROGRAMS

Visual Arts Program

The Visual Arts program offers unique instruction that values process above product. Students receive lessons in art history and on a variety of mediums, including drawing, painting, ceramics, sculpture, and architecture. They have ample time in the art studio to explore the medium of their choice using high quality materials. Students are encouraged to find artistic inspiration from the surrounding world.

Music, Dance, Drama Program

The Music, Dance, Drama program at Mountaintop is rooted in Orff-Schulwerk, an approach to building musicianship in every learner through the integration of music, movement, speech, and drama.

Younger children experience music in the classroom with weekly visits from the music guide. Elementary students receive group lessons and have open studio time to create and collaborate. Middle school students participate in creative expression workshops on topics that include an annual play, dance instruction, instrumental ensembles, and composition. Students present their work at three large performances during the year.

Garden to Table Program

The Garden to Table program works in conjunction with the Ecology and Permaculture programs to allow children to see the complete food cycle from seed to table. Each week, elementary and middle school students join the chef in harvesting and preparing lunch for their classmates in the professional kitchen. Children are encouraged to try new foods as they prepare a wide variety of ethnic and regional dishes.

Ecology Program

Students at Mountaintop engage in the Ecology Program beginning in kindergarten. The program creates opportunities for children to develop strong connections and competency within the living ecosystem. Students explore biology and botany through sensory experiences, food production, and observation. They practice environmental stewardship in the gardens, chicken coop, fruit orchard, and natural environment.





Through their ecology lessons, students learn self-sufficiency, herbalism and wildcrafting, natural health and wellness, and the investigative process. As students progress through the program, they are challenged to apply their knowledge to current environmental issues, personal passions, and community service projects.

Physical Education

Students at Mountaintop have ample opportunity for movement through both spontaneous and organized sports activities. The approach makes physical fitness accessible to all children and emphasizes skill development, fitness, and sportsmanship. Children learn to celebrate their own achievements, as well as the accomplishments of their peers.

Spanish

Students work with a Spanish Specialist from the Elementary level level through middle school. In the early years, conversation and an appreciation for the culture are emphasized. As children advance, the curriculum becomes more academic and culminates with the completion of either high school-level Spanish I or II. Spanish instruction is tailored to each developmental level and takes advantage of the young child's ability to absorb language.

Technology

Upper elementary and middle school students receive lessons in technology to improve their practical skills, digital citizenship, and internet safety. They also make use of technology for creative purposes such as design and video production.

CAMPUS

Campus

The campus is a 9-acre classroom. Students' work includes gardening, animal care, and maintaining the wildlife habitat.

Greenhouse

The 850 square foot geodesic Growing Dome has beds for growing produce as well as a 2300 gallon aquaculture tank.

Garden

The expansive Big Garden is home to a wide variety of fruits and veggies for students to tend, harvest and enjoy. The adjacent chicken coop provides eggs, a place to recycle kitchen scraps, and just plain fun.

Places to Play

Mountaintop's natural play spaces, soccer field, basketball court, gym and playgrounds provide students with lots of options for finding fun with friends during breaks from the garden and kitchen.
