

Welcome to SD

Founded in 1850 by the Dominican Sisters, San Domenico holds the unique distinction of being certified as California's oldest independent school.

The expansive 515-acre campus serves a truly global student community. As Marin County's only K-12 school—with boarding and day options in the high school—SD's unique program attracts students from throughout the San Francisco Bay Area and beyond, with more than 20 countries represented among the student body.

Purpose-Driven Education

The diverse and inclusive educational program of SD is grounded in its Dominican heritage and educational philosophy: to inspire students to develop character and integrity and to apply their academic knowledge to the challenges of our times in order to create a better world.

This philosophy is reflected in the daily life of the San Domenico community. The faculty teach in a spirit of open inquiry and critical thinking. Students tend the garden, learn interconnectedness through the ecological literacy program, and reflect on their place within the sacred community of nature. They study ethics and create service learning projects to spread social justice, peace, and equality for all people. In every activity, they cooperate and collaborate to create a community of respect and belonging.

San Domenico is a non-religious school. Yet the mission of the school and the school culture are infused with values gained from the school's Dominican heritage. Religions and cultures are celebrated from all over the world. Students take comparative religion courses where they learn the history and teachings of many different faiths. With that context, they explore their own purpose, sense of meaning, and philosophy of life. They develop their own authentic values. They are encouraged to practice those values in the school community and in the larger world.

An exceptional education—where values and academics join together—creates more than just great students. It develops great people.



Cohesive Curriculum

A comprehensive K-12 education provides students academic and social-emotional continuity and stability that is unparalleled in most school settings. Young people who experience a cohesive curriculum that builds upon itself year-over-year are better able to integrate and retain what they have learned, while not being disrupted by school setting changes, which are often accompanied by significant stress, achievement loss, and curricular content gaps. Administration

Currently at San Domenico, the senior leadership team of eight reports directly to the Head of School and includes the CFO, Directors of Advancement, Admissions, Athletics and Marketing and Communications, two division heads, and the Assistant Head for Student Life.

Governance

San Domenico is sponsored and ultimately governed by the Sisters of the Third Order of St. Dominic, Congregation of the Most Holy Name. The Mission Holding Corporation is charged with a variety of duties and responsibilities in overseeing the governance of the school, one of which is to authorize the Board of Trustees to conduct the business of managing the school. By by-law, the size of the Board may range from 7 to 28 with at least 1/7th of the trustees being members of the sponsoring Congregation. Currently, the Board has 15 members each of whom may serve for two consecutive of 3-year terms after which the trustee must step down for a period of at least one year before rejoining the Board if asked. The Board meets bi-monthly throughout the year and has 8 standing committees: Advancement, Audit, Committee on Trustees, Executive, Finance, Investment, Master Planning and Facilities, and Mission Enhancement.

Admissions

The Admissions Office at San Domenico is lead by the Director of Admissions and Enrollment Management who oversees a team of five. The work of the Admissions Office is complex given the school's commitment to enrolling qualified students for both the day and boarding programs. Significant efforts of late have been made to reduce the attrition between 8th and 9th grade.

Future Leadership of SD

As San Domenico builds on its extraordinary 173-year history, the Board of Trustees has launched a national and international search to identify a new Head of School for July 1, 2024. To that end, and to assist the Board in clarifying the goals and opportunities the new Head will face, Marcus Hurlbut and Joan Beauregard of Educators Collaborative solicited input from members of the school community during an on-campus visit and by means of an electronic survey. Those interviewed and surveyed included faculty, students, administrators, staff, parents, trustees, alumni and community members. Based on this input, the following represents a summary of San Domenico's strengths, the challenges and opportunities it faces in the next three to five years, and the personal and professional qualities the trustees and the school seek in the next Head of School.

Strengths of the School

The following are the most notable strengths of San Domenico and include enduring practices and traditions that will be expected to carry over through a leadership transition. Overall, the climate and community of the school are in excellent shape and the commitment to the school and its culture is a unique element of the San Domenico experience for the 680 students and the faculty and staff of over 100.

- San Domenico School is the only school in Marin County that serves students from Kindergarten through 12th grade, and the only school with both boarding and day students for high school.
- There is community-wide appreciation of the school's 173-year history of offering college preparatory educational opportunities to students of all backgrounds and faiths.
- All constituencies spoke to a deep understanding of San Domenico's Dominican heritage, diverse and
 interfaith history, and the values of study, reflection, community and service that inform the school
 culture and program. The appreciation for the school centers not just on its delivery of exceptional
 education but on social-emotional learning and development of a sense of purpose as well.
- The school's beautiful 515-acre campus offers a variety of opportunities for recreation, outdoor education, and future growth, as well as an idyllic environment for both community-building and serene self-reflection.
- The community is committed to the goal of educating global citizens who will work to create a just and sustainable world.
- The school has longstanding, highly reputed music and performing arts programs, from its Virtuoso program for aspiring string musicians to its well-attended musical theater productions.
- The school has a growing athletic program with strong momentum and recent major commitments to facilities and infrastructure.
- The school receives high praise for its response to the pandemic and its success in providing remote, hybrid and exceptional in-person learning.
- A school-wide belief in the benefits of day and boarding students interacting with each other is not
 just acknowledged but celebrated as an invaluable component of the learning experience at San
 Domenico.
- San Domenico students are kind and positive with each other and enjoy their interactions with adults.
- The Board of Trustees is committed to the strategic development of San Domenico School while understanding and supporting the Head's role in leading and managing the operations of the school.



Challenges and Opportunities for the Next Head of School

The responsibilities of the Head of School are many and varied. With them will come the inevitable challenges that are common to all independent schools as well as some that are unique to San Domenico at this point in its history. Among these are:

Celebrate and further define San Domenico's identity:

- Publicly launch a new mission and vision statement, which are the product of an extensive process that is concluding now, and integrate them into the fabric of the school.
- Strengthen the school's brand, using common language to describe its distinctive qualities and the value proposition it offers to families.
- Oversee the development of an enrollment management plan which encourages all faculty and staff
 to provide support to an internal marketing effort to improve retention from middle school to the
 upper school.
- Create a cohesive educational experience across all grades inspiring families to remain at San Domenico through high school graduation.
- More clearly define what constitutes 'academic excellence' and how it can be measured to inform internal and external marketing.
- Continue to elevate San Domenico's commitment to Diversity, Equity and Inclusion.
- Support the crucial role the faculty plays in providing an exceptional experience for students with attention to recruitment, retention, and professional growth.

Ensure San Domenico's financial health and stability:

- Clarify and leverage what a K-12 day school with a high school boarding program offers in marketing, enrollment and tuition revenue.
- Build on initiatives to strengthen enrollment through effective branding, marketing and admissions efforts.
- Strengthen fundraising with attention to major gifts, alumni/ae giving and targeted campaigns.
- Explore and implement, as feasible, additional sources for non-tuition revenue.
- Continue the evaluation of campus and plant needs including revenue generating opportunities and support for expanded program offerings.

Celebrate and further define San Domenico's commitment to a successful and sustainable structure:

- Evaluate the administrative structure to ensure that it serves the needs of the school community.
- Ensure that the talents of administrators, faculty and staff are utilized and valued, clarify reporting structures and teams and create a well-defined, equitable structure.
- Build trust with faculty and staff: review the complexity of decision making, clarify channels for constituent input and find the right balance for communicating outcomes so that there is appropriate transparency around decision making and constituents feel informed.
- Find joy and balance in the competing demands of being present for students and faculty/staff on campus while also engaging in outreach and offering a visible presence to audiences off campus.
- Work in partnership with the Board to keep San Domenico School relevant and responsive to changing times and the needs of the larger community.
- Work in partnership with the Board of Trustees to launch the process of developing an updated Strategic Plan which will play an important role in creating a collective sense of purpose and direction.







Qualifications and Attributes of the Next Head of School

The next Head of San Domenico School will be an experienced, approachable, and strategic leader. The next Head of School will be a leader who ideally possesses the following characteristics and qualities:

- A highly visible advocate for the school, who embraces and embodies San Domenico's traditions and mission.
- An outgoing and warm personality with a genuine desire to engage with the school community at every level.
- An empathetic consensus builder and unifier who looks for ways to build connections, find common ground and create shared experiences.
- An authentic, enthusiastic and demonstrated commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion.
- An astute listener and observer who will take the time to understand the school and work with school leadership to create a plan and courageously take the steps to move forward to a stronger, sustainable future.
- A systems thinker who possesses a clear sense of how the various school functions interconnect with one another.
- Experience in engaging multiple constituencies and building trusting relationships inside and outside the school community.
- Experience and demonstrated success in financial management and enrollment growth.
- Demonstrated experience and success in fundraising and marketing, and a willingness to take a critical leadership role in both.
- A proven record of identifying, developing, motivating and retaining a talented faculty and staff.
- An articulate and charismatic spokesperson in the school community and beyond.
- Solid understanding of best practices in independent schools and the ability to build systems for effective and efficient operations.
- The vision, conviction, and leadership skills to keep the school dynamic and evolving, while honoring its longstanding values and history.
- Evidences an abundance of characteristics typically found in successful school leaders: approachable
 and responsive, courage with kindness, honesty, character above reproach, excellent verbal and
 written communication skills, relationship builder, data-driven decision-maker, lifelong learner,
 humility, and a sense of humor.
