

Early Childhood | Ages 13 months - 5 years

The Waldorf early childhood programs at the Waldorf School of Philadelphia consist of our Forest Parent and Child Program, Nursery for children ages two-three, and a Mixed-Age Early Childhood Program for three-five year old children.

Each class is tailored to meet the nuanced development of the growing child. We provide families the opportunity of extended care and our early childhood programs have been certified by WECAN.

Lower School | Grades 1 - 5

Mastery in Middle School and Beyond

Do you recognize your child? An astronomer, historian, and a mathematician. A sculptor, a classical musician, and conversant in another language. Your child can recite Shakespeare, write haiku poetry, and describe the wonders of sacred geometry.

The Waldorf School of Philadelphia offers a comprehensive liberal arts education - in middle school. It's an uncompromising, yet unexpected foundation that will serve your child for the rest of their life. When students graduate from eighth grade at the Waldorf School of Philadelphia, they have developed into critical thinkers with agile penetrating minds, ready to attain new heights, and are sought after by independent schools and public magnet schools.

Special Subject Classes

The Waldorf School of Philadelphia offers a fully-integrated learning experience through an unparalleled array of specialty classes that complement and extend the core academic subjects. Classes are led by qualified specialists who help students develop practical and physical aspects of a challenging, yet enjoyable, well-rounded education. Specialty classes are compulsory for all students and this particular array of classes is provided to cultivate deep learning across all aspects of human capacity. The specialty classes provide an impressive experiential encounter with themes that echo and parallel the whole curriculum. These classes include Spanish Language, Handwork, Games and Movement, Eurythmy, Music, String Orchestra and Woodwork.

Student Support Services

Waldorf Education aims to support the development of the whole child – head, hands, and heart. Core to our beliefs is that children develop and learn at different speeds, in different ways and that many encounter challenges along their academic journey. Sometimes children benefit from extra support. When the need arises, we strive to provide our students with supplementary learning support designed to meet their individual needs. The support program at the Waldorf School of Philadelphia includes some or all of the following:

- Developmental milestone review upon entry to first-grade entry
- Second and third grade literacy review
- Annual review of developmental and academic milestones
- Recommendations for further assessments, therapies, and remediation outside school by specialized professionals when necessary
- Small group math and reading instruction for 2nd-8th-grade students
- Ongoing support and consultation for class teachers through our Learning Support Coordinator (LSC)
- Individualized accommodation plans
- Upper grades math support
- High School entry support
- Therapeutic Eurythmy

Learning Support

The Waldorf School of Philadelphia partners with Learn It Academic Systems to provide certified reading and math teachers who work collaboratively with our classroom teachers to support students through small group systematic











instruction tailored to meet individual needs.

- Instruction is aligned to the Waldorf curriculum and informed by child development.
- Based on sound research and instructional best practices, including a multi-sensory approach to literacy.
- Built-in formative assessments, and progress monitoring guide lesson planning.
- Close communication between Learn It Academic Systems and school staff ensures that students master classroom objectives.
- Parents receive periodic progress reports on student achievement.

Participation in Learn It Academic Systems' learning support services also helps to provide scaffolded instruction and guided practice activities that increase a student's self-confidence and motivation to learn.

School Counseling Support

The Waldorf School of Philadelphia provides expert support for enrolled students struggling with behavioral, academic, social, emotional, and life skills issues through Learn It Academic Systems' credentialed, master's level counselors. Learn It Academic Systems' counseling staff work closely with Waldorf teachers and when appropriate, parents in support of the students being served.

Our Graduates

The Waldorf School of Philadelphia graduates are sought after by independent and public schools alike and have many options before them. Our graduates transition successfully into highly competitive public and independent high schools and colleges. Approximately 50% of our alumni choose to attend public magnet schools, 25% choose independent schools, and 25% choose to attend public high school in their local area. These schools include: Central High School, Science Leadership Academy, George School, Abington Friends School, Academy of the New Church, Germantown Friends School, Kimberton Waldorf School, La Salle College High School, Penn Charter High School, Phillips Academy High School for Creative and Performing Arts (CAPA).

Parents Association

The Waldorf School of Philadelphia is a rarity, even among Waldorf schools. Our school is young, diverse, energetic and urban; a magnet for creative, community-minded people.

Community involvement is a central tenet of The Waldorf School of Philadelphia as one of the key goals of Waldorf Education is to help develop creative, thoughtful, socially conscious and engaged citizens. In this regard, our community is active, engaged and thriving.

Future Leadership

As the Waldorf School of Philadelphia enters its second quarter century, the Board of Trustees has launched a national search to identify a new Head of School for July 1, 2023. To that end, and to assist the Board in clarifying the goals and opportunities the new Head will face, Nat Conard of Educators' Collaborative solicited input from members of the school community during a campus visit, virtual interviews, and by means of an online survey. Based on this input, as well as input from the Search Committee, the following represents a summary of WSP's strengths, the challenges and opportunities it faces in the next three to five years, and the personal and professional qualities the trustees and the school seek in the next Head of School.

Notable Strengths of the Waldorf School of Philadelphia

There has never been a more exciting time to join the Philly Waldorf community. The next Head of School will find a modern, organic learning environment in the heart of Germantown that provides a decidedly independent form of education that creates decidedly independent thinkers.

Strengths most frequently mentioned are:

• The school's fundamental commitment to Waldorf principles and pedagogy and to creating a vibrant learning community based on a deep understanding of the child, integrating the intellectual with the artistic and the practical with the beautiful

- Love, reverence, and respect for childhood in a community that seeks to foster and support thoughtful, socially conscious, and engaged citizens
- A dedication to the importance of community, and as a result, a strong and committed community characterized by connections, openness, friendliness, and kindness
- The school's commitment to diversity and finding ways to lead in bringing Waldorf education to an inclusive next chapter
- An experienced, caring, dedicated, and highly Waldorf-trained faculty that is committed to a deep understanding of individual students' needs and that values productive parent-teacher relationships
- In keeping with Waldorf principles, the school's outstanding programs in handwork and the arts, connections to the natural world and the campus, and commitment to experiential learning and play
- A culture of nimble adaptivity, strong organization, and constant improvement

Opportunities and challenges for the next head of school

The responsibilities of the Head of School are many and varied. With them will come some challenges that are common to all independent schools as they transition from the global pandemic and grapple with the polarization of society, as well as some challenges and opportunities that are unique to Philly Waldorf at this time in its history. Among them are:

- After two years of pandemic related stresses and restrictions, rebuilding the strong sense of community that has long characterized the school
- In a post-pandemic world, restoring important community events that build community and excitement about the school
- In a Waldorf school that has recently transitioned to a Head-of-School model of governance, building strong trust and relationships among the faculty, administration, and Board and inspiring the community around a shared vision
- Continuing to expect a high level of cultural competency and commitment to DEIJ initiatives including in faculty hiring, student recruitment, and curriculum design, and creating a culture of belonging for all students, faculty, staff, parents, and community members
- As a tuition-driven school, enhancing financial sustainability through effective enrollment management that addresses both recruitment and retention
- With the Board, cultivating a culture of philanthropy within the school community, leading to a capital campaign to purchase the school's campus, thereby ensuring a strong legacy of Waldorf education in Philadelphia for future generations
- In an inclusive way, develop and clearly articulate a vision for the future of the school that builds on the school's significant strengths, is aligned with Waldorf philosophy, is forward thinking, and puts students first
- Foster dynamic and innovative teaching resulting in Waldorf educational excellence
- Attract, retain, develop, and mentor educational leaders
- Support our school's re-accreditation process, empowering faculty and staff in the process

The next Head of Waldorf School of Philadelphia will be a warm, collaborative, strategic thinker with a deep reverence for childhood and a passion for generating an inner enthusiasm for learning in every child. She or he will be:

- Thoughtful listener who is calm, patient, and compassionate
- Outstanding communicator who is clear, candid, transparent, and authentic
- Demonstrated experience of strategic planning
- Creative, critical thinker and problem solver
